
Christopher Buckley: August 15 at 7 PM




Tovah Martin: September 16 at 7PM

The Essex Library has loads of audio books you can download for free to help you while away the long hours on the road. These are a few of our favorites!




Who's Your Favorite Author?





Jessica: *The Witch of Belladonna Bay: A Novel* by **Suzanne Palmieri**. Bronwyn Walen hasn't set eyes on the red dirt of Magnolia Creek, Alabama, for fourteen years—not since her mama died. Her brother, Patrick, is imprisoned for the murder of her childhood best friend, and her eccentric father, Jackson, is at his wits' end while her eleven-year-old niece, Byrd, runs wild. Bronwyn finds herself once again surrounded by the troubled family she left behind.

Sue: *Accidental Brothers: The Story of Twins Exchanged at Birth and the Power of Nature and Nurture* by **Nancy L. Segal and Yesika S. Montoya**. This is the unique story of two sets of identical Colombian twin brothers who discovered at age 25 that they were mistakenly raised as fraternal twins when they were not even biological brothers. Due to an oversight in the hospital, one twin in each pair was switched with a twin in the other pair.



Richard: *The Bone Clocks* by **David Mitchell**. Following a scalding row with her mother, fifteen-year-old Holly Sykes slams the door on her old life. Holly is no typical teenage runaway. As a sensitive child, she was once contacted by voices she knew as "the radio people." She's a lightning rod for psychic phenomena. As she wanders deeper into the English countryside, visions and coincidences reorder her reality until they assume the aura of a nightmare brought to life.


Emily: *I'll be Your Blue Sky: A Novel* by **Marisa de los Santos**. On the weekend of her wedding, Clare Hobbes meets an elderly woman named Edith Herron. During the course of a single conversation, Edith gives Clare the courage to end her engagement to her charming, yet possessive fiancé. Three weeks later, Clare learns that Edith has died and has given her Blue Sky House. Shifting between the 1950s and the present, a decades-old mystery will come to light through the alternating voices of Clare and Edith.










Ann: *The Garden in Every Sense and Season* by Tovah Martin. So much of gardening is focused on the long list of chores: the weeding, the planting, and the pruning. But what about the joy a garden can provide? Packed with lush color photographs and 100 evocative essays, Martin shares sage garden advice, offers intimate reflections on her own garden, and urges gardeners to inhale, savor, and become more attuned with their gardens.

Diane: *Little Broken Things: A Novel* by Nicole Baart. When Quinn Cruz receives a cryptic text message from her older sister, Nora, she doesn't think much of it. Since they haven't seen each other in nearly a year, their relationship consists mostly of infrequent phone calls and the occasional e-mail. When a haunted-looking Nora shows up just hours later, a chain reaction is set into motion that will change their lives forever. It's a matter of life and death, and the lengths a woman will go to protect the ones she loves.



Anna: *The Duchess Deal* by Tessa Dare. When the Duke of Ashbury returns from war scarred, he realizes he needs an heir, which means he needs a wife. When Emma Gladstone, a vicar's daughter turned seamstress visits wearing a wedding dress, he decides on the spot that she'll do. His terms are simple: They will be husband and wife by night only, with no questions about his battle scars. Most importantly, once she's pregnant with his heir, they need never share a bed again. Emma is no pushover, but she has secrets and some rules of her own.







Changes to the Online Catalog:






