
wine. And of course, Ina Garten (author of the *Barefoot Contessa* cookbooks) would cook for us!"






NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH














MONTHLY STAFF FAVORITES

Unprepared for the weather and the isolation, they fight to build a home in this harsh land.



NOVEL BY REBECCA MAKKAI. Meet the Devohrs: Zee, a Marxist literary scholar who detests her parents' wealth, but she finds herself living in their carriage house; Gracie, her mother, who claims she can tell your lot in life by looking at your teeth; and Bruce, her step-father, stockpiling supplies for the Y2K apocalypse and perpetually late for his tee time. If uncovered, the secrets of the hundred-year house could turn everything they think they know about her family on its head.




ANNA: THE FIRST TIME AT FIRELIGHT FALLS BY JULIE

RICHARD: MY BRIEF HISTORY: A MEMOIR
















JANA: BETWEEN THE WORLD AND ME BY TA-NEHISI
