
WHO WOULD BE YOUR IDEAL LITERARY DINING COMPANIONS? AND WHY?




ANNA: *CODE NAME VERITY* BY ELIZABETH WEIN. 1943: A British spy plane crashes in Nazi-occupied France. When "Verity" is arrested by the Gestapo, she's sure she doesn't stand a chance. As a secret agent captured in enemy territory, she's living a spy's worst nightmare. Her Nazi interrogators give her a choice: reveal her mission or face a grisly execution.

RICHARD: *THE SECRET SCRIPTURE* BY SEBASTIAN BARRY. Sligo, Ireland: As Roseanne McNulty's hundredth year draws near, she decides to record the events of her life, hiding the manuscript beneath her floorboards. Doctor Grene, Roseanne's caretaker, takes a special interest in her case and discovers a document written by a local priest that tells a very different story of Roseanne's life than what she recalls.



REAGAN: *INVISIBLE MAN* BY RALPH ELLISON. As he journeys from the Deep South to the streets and basements of Harlem, from a horrifying "battle royal" where black men are reduced to fighting animals, to a Communist rally where they are elevated to the status of trophies, Ralph Ellison's nameless protagonist ushers readers into a parallel universe in this classic.

ANN: *THE THOUGHTFUL GARDENER* BY JINNY BLOM. Jinny Blom shares insight into the creative process she has developed while designing more than 250 gardens around the world. Jinny believes that garden design should lead from a house and its context. For her, design is more a matter of intelligence and appropriateness than imposing a particular style.




