




CONNECTICUT RIVER SHIPBUILDING BY WICK GRISWOLD AND RUTH MAJOR


YOU ARE EATING PLASTIC! BY MARIA SIMON



When a local developer is found dead with a mysterious photograph left next to the body, the Thursday Murder Club suddenly find themselves in the middle of their first live case.



AGENT SONYA BY BEN MACINTYRE

MacIntyre uncovers the true story behind the Cold War's most intrepid female spy. In 1942, Ursula Burton lived in a small cottage with her family. She seemed to be living an unassuming life but behind the facade, Burton was a dedicated Communist, a Soviet colonel, and a veteran agent, gathering the scientific secrets that would enable the Soviet Union to build a devastating weapon.

DON'T LOOK FOR ME BY WENDY WALKER


